

Should THC levels be regulated?

 THC is the main intoxicant, also responsible for increasing anxiety and panic attacks

 Mexican marijuana is 4-8% THC, sinsemilla sold in stores typically ranges from 10-25% THC

• Dutch are discussing limiting THC at 15%

Hash oil wax/shatter being used to "Dab" Goal is not to create a panic about "dabs"; may just be a small-scale regional fad that won't last.

CBD is now getting more attention

• CBD is a cannabinoid that is believed to offset some of the effects of THC

- Breeding for maximum THC decreased CBD levels
 - Eg., Burgdorf, Kilmer, & Pacula, 2011

Price matters

Influences consumption and revenues

 10% decline in price leads to ~3% increase in marijuana participation

- Pacula, 2010; Gallet, 2013

Options to elevate price

Require product testing

Reduce competition

Impose taxes

Taxes and regulations may not fully offset decline in price

• If taxes are too high, there will be evasion

- There are alternatives to taxing by weight
 - E.g., ad valorem, % THC, THC:CBD ratio

• Optimal tax today may not be optimal in future

How easy will it be to change policies?

• Early adopters will probably suffer growing pains

 Raises questions about how much flexibility to build into the taxation and regulatory regime

Another idea to consider: Sunset clause

• As sunset date approaches, legislature or voters could vote to sustain the law or try something else

• Could give jurisdictions an escape clause to overcome the lobbying muscle of the new industry

Concluding thoughts

• These truly are uncharted waters

 Reasonable people can disagree about marijuana legalization
