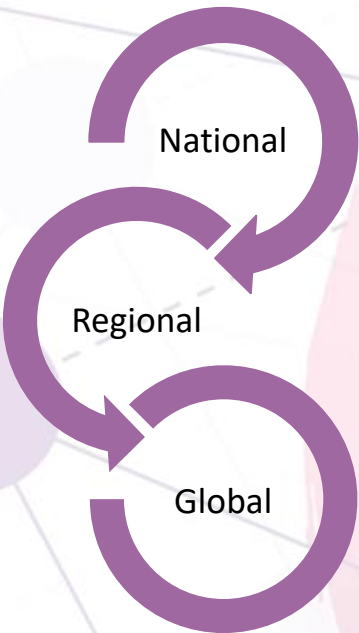
Administrative data sources

Population Surveys

- ❖ 9 Indicators (+ 4 indicators)
- ❖ Very low data coverage
- ❖ For some indicators, as high as 20% of countries

## 16.1.3 Prevalence of Violence (UNODC)

### Physical Violence

**ICCS 02011** Intentional or reckless application of physical force inflicted upon the body of a person

- Threatened to hurt you physically with a weapon
- Threatened to hurt you physically without a weapon,
- Pushed you, shoved you or shook you
- Slapped you or punched you
- Threw a hard object at you
- Grabbed you, pulled your hair or dragged you
- Beat you with their fist or a hard object, or kicked
- Burned you
- Suffocate you or strangle you
- Cut or stabbed you
- Shot at you
- Beat your head against something
- Something else to physically hurt you, not counting a sexual attack

### Psychological Violence

**ICCS 0208** Any act intended to induce fear or emotional distress (No global definition)

- Hurt, threatened to hurt, or threatened to take away your children
- Limited your choices about family planning
- Expected you to ask permission to see a doctor
- Tried to prevent you from talking to other men/women out of jealousy, or insisted on knowing your whereabouts
- Controlled what clothes you are allowed to wear and told you how to dress against your will
- Scare or intimidate you on purpose
- Damaged or destroyed your possessions or property
- Harmed, or threatened to harm, someone close to you
- Restricted your freedom of movement
- Limit your contact with family or friends

### Sexual Violence

**ICCS 0301** Unwanted sexual act or attempt to obtain a sexual act without valid consent or with consent as a result of intimidation, force, fraud, coercion, threat, deception, abuse of power or position, use of drugs or alcohol, or position of vulnerability

- Forced you to have sexual intercourse attempted to force you to have sexual intercourse
- Make you have sexual intercourse when you could not refuse
- Force you or threatened you or
- Blackmailed you to have sexual intercourse with someone else.
- Because you were afraid of what might happen if you refused?
- Stripped you, touched your intimate parts – genitals or breasts –or kissed
- Forced you to do something else of sexual nature that you found degrading or humiliating.
- Threaten you with violent sexual
- Acts, such as rape

## 11.7.2 Harassment (UNODC)

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### Non-Sexual Harassment

**ICCS 02081** Acts that harass or are intended to harass a person (*Harassment, at minimum, is improper behaviour directed at and which is offensive to a person by another person who reasonably knew the behaviour was offensive. This includes objectionable or unacceptable conduct that demeans, belittles or causes personal humiliation or embarrassment to an individual*).

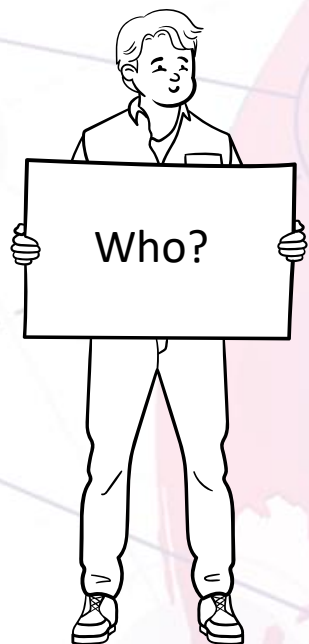
- Messages, e-mails or calls
- Offensive, threatening or humiliating comments
- Offensive or threatening gestures
- Posted offensive, or embarrassing comments, photos or videos of you online
- followed you against your will, either physically or online

### Sexual Harassment

- Unwanted sexual proposition
- Unwanted messages, e-mails, calls of a sexual nature sexually explicit messages
- Photos or videos of you posted online or sent to anyone without your consent
- Unwanted sexual comments about your physical appearance or body
- Unwanted sexual gestures, whistling and leering or anyone got inappropriately close to you
- Indecently exposed
- Unwanted gifts

# Survey Characteristics

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## Target population

- 18 years
- Resident population
- One randomly selected respondent by household
- Proxy interviews are NOT recommended

## Other considerations

- Recommended interviewing: Face to Face (CAPI)
- Length: 28 -30 min (based on paradata from 4 countries)

## Sample

Optimal sample size is to be decided by national teams considering national capacities, resources and level of disaggregation. The Survey recommends Random probability design and Full geographical coverage.

A booster might be required for extremely rare population groups

# Survey Implementation Options

A

Full implementation of the Survey, including all modules, sections and disaggregations.

Used to respond to considerable data gaps.

General assessment of the SDG 16 progress.

Recommend if no prior data collections have been made.



B

SDG 16 Survey merged with another survey on peaceful, justice and inclusive institutions

To align indicators that were previously collected with the recommended methodology.

To continue data production and continue series (as much as possible).



C

Integration into ongoing continuous survey where one or more modules are integrated in a host survey. Ideally a social survey in a similar thematic

Intended to fill specific data gaps or to respond to a greater demand of information in a phased approach.
